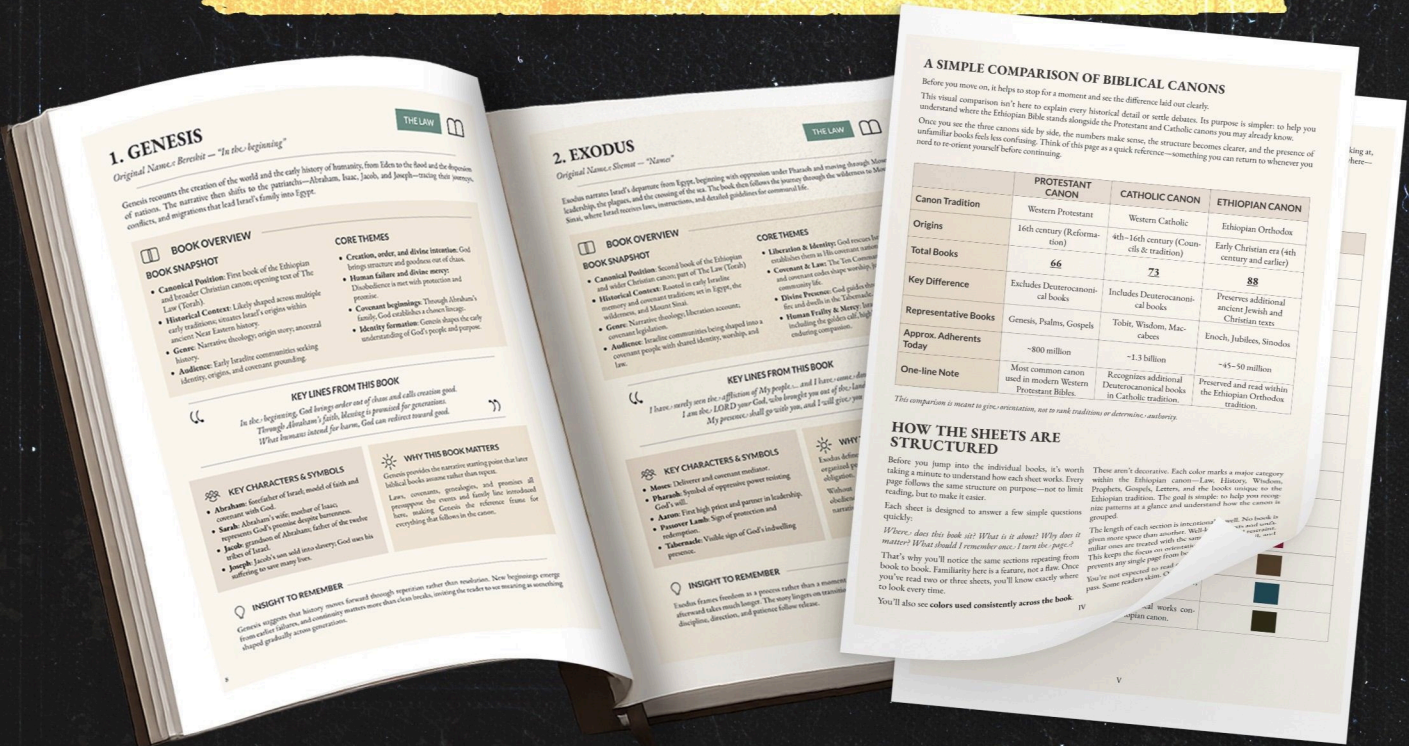

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WHAT THIS BOOK IS — AND ISN'T

If you are holding this book, chances are you've already heard that the Ethiopian Bible is different.

More books. Unfamiliar names. A canon that doesn't quite match what most Western readers expect.

This guide exists for a simple reason: to help you make sense of that difference without turning it into a problem.

This is **not** a Bible.

It is **not** a translation, a commentary, or a theological argument. And it is definitely not an attempt to tell you what to believe.

What you will find here is a clear, visual way to understand how the Ethiopian biblical canon is organized, what each book is about, and why it holds a place within a long and living Christian tradition.

Every book of the canon is given the same space, the same structure, and the same care—whether it is familiar or entirely new to you.

All you need is curiosity—and the willingness to explore a biblical world that has been preserved, read, and heard for centuries, often outside the spotlight of Western Christianity.

The pages that follow are designed to help you see the whole canon before you step into its individual books. Once you know where you are, reading becomes easier.

WHAT MAKES THE ETHIOPIAN BIBLE UNIQUE

If you're wondering why the Ethiopian Bible has more books, you're not missing something.

It's a fair question—and a common one.

Most of us grow up with a Bible shaped by a Western tradition. Depending on your background, that usually means:

- a **Protestant** canon with 66 books, or
- a **Catholic** canon with 73 books.

So when you hear that the Ethiopian Bible contains **88 books**, it's natural to pause.

Here's the key thing to know: Christianity did not develop in one place, under one authority, or along a single timeline. From its earliest centuries, different Christian communities preserved different collections of sacred texts. The Ethiopian Church followed its own continuous path—early, rooted, and uninterrupted.

This doesn't mean you're looking at a “corrected” Bible.

And it doesn't mean other traditions are incomplete or mistaken.

It simply means that the Ethiopian canon reflects a **different Christian memory**, one that kept certain books because they were read, taught, and heard as Scripture within that community for generations.

As you move through this guide, some titles will feel familiar. Others may be entirely new. A few might quietly challenge assumptions you've carried for years. That's not a problem—it's part of the experience.

You're not being asked to compare traditions or take sides. This book isn't here to argue. It's here to help you see how the Ethiopian canon fits together on its own terms.

That's why you'll find a simple visual comparison between the Protestant, Catholic, and Ethiopian canons here. Not to overwhelm you, and not to rank one above another—but to give you your bearings. Once you know where the Ethiopian Bible stands, the rest becomes much easier to approach.

What you're holding is not a list of “extra books”.

It's a complete canon, shaped by centuries of reading, worship, and transmission—and this guide is here to help you walk through it with clarity and confidence.

A SIMPLE COMPARISON OF BIBLICAL CANONS

Before you move on, it helps to stop for a moment and see the difference laid out clearly.

This visual comparison isn't here to explain every historical detail or settle debates. Its purpose is simpler: to help you understand where the Ethiopian Bible stands alongside the Protestant and Catholic canons you may already know.

Once you see the three canons side by side, the numbers make sense, the structure becomes clearer, and the presence of unfamiliar books feels less confusing. Think of this page as a quick reference—something you can return to whenever you need to re-orient yourself before continuing.

HOW THE SHEETS ARE STRUCTURED

Before you jump into the individual books, it's worth taking a minute to understand how each sheet works. Every page follows the same structure on purpose—not to limit reading, but to make it easier.

Each sheet is designed to answer a few simple questions quickly:

Where does this book sit? What is it about? Why does it matter? What should I remember once I turn the page?

That's why you'll notice the same sections repeating from book to book. Familiarity here is a feature, not a flaw. Once you've read two or three sheets, you'll know exactly where to look every time.

You'll also see **colors used consistently across the book**.

These aren't decorative. Each color marks a major category within the Ethiopian canon—Law, History, Wisdom, Prophets, Gospels, Epistles, and the books unique to the Ethiopian tradition. The goal is simple: to help you recognize patterns at a glance and understand how the canon is grouped.

The length of each section is intentional as well. No book is given more space than another. Well-known texts and unfamiliar ones are treated with the same balance and restraint. This keeps the focus on orientation rather than detail, and prevents any single page from becoming overwhelming.

You're not expected to read every word carefully on a first pass. Some readers skim. Others pause on a single line.

Both approaches work. These pages are meant to be revisited, not mastered in one sitting. Think of each sheet as a clear window into a book you may or may not know yet.

Once you know where you are and what you're looking at, deeper reading—whether in Scripture itself or elsewhere—becomes far less intimidating.

















1. GENESIS

THE LAW



Original Name: Bereshit — “In the beginning”

Genesis recounts the creation of the world and the early history of humanity, from Eden to the flood and the dispersion of nations. The narrative then shifts to the patriarchs—Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, and Joseph—tracing their journeys, conflicts, and migrations that lead Israel’s family into Egypt.



BOOK OVERVIEW

Genesis suggests that history moves forward through repetition rather than resolution. New beginnings emerge from earlier failures, and continuity matters more than clean breaks, inviting the reader to see meaning as something shaped gradually across generations.

2. EXODUS

THE LAW



Original Name: Shemot — “Names”

Exodus narrates Israel’s departure from Egypt, beginning with oppression under Pharaoh and moving through Moses’ leadership, the plagues, and the crossing of the sea. The book then follows the journey through the wilderness to Mount Sinai, where Israel receives laws, instructions, and detailed guidelines for communal life.

3. LEVITICUS



Original Name: Vayikra — “And He Called”

Leviticus presents a collection of laws and instructions delivered at Sinai, focusing on offerings, priestly duties, purity regulations, and ethical commands. The book outlines rituals for worship, rules for daily conduct, and guidelines governing community life, festivals, and sacred time within Israel’s camp.



BOOK OVERVIEW

4. NUMBERS

THE LAW



Original Name: Bemidbar — “In the Wilderness”

Numbers traces Israel’s journey from Mount Sinai toward the promised land, marked by censuses, camp organization, travel stages, and repeated setbacks. The narrative records rebellions, leadership challenges, and generational transition as the people move through the wilderness, concluding with Israel positioned east of the Jordan.

5. DEUTERONOMY

THE LAW



Original Name: Devarim — “Words”

Deuteronomy presents Moses’ final speeches to Israel on the plains of Moab, reviewing past events, restating laws, and preparing the people for life in the promised land. The book revisits earlier commands, recounts key moments from the wilderness journey, and concludes with blessings, warnings, and Moses’ death.

Original Name: Yehoshua — “The LORD Is Salvation”

The book describes the capture of key cities, the distribution of land among the tribes, covenant renewal ceremonies, and concludes with Joshua’s final address and death.

7. JUDGES

Original Name: Shophetim — “Judges”

Judges covers the period between Joshua’s death and the rise of monarchy, depicting Israel’s life in the land without centralized leadership. The book presents recurring episodes of oppression, deliverance, and relapse, as regional leaders emerge to confront external threats and internal instability.

8. RUTH

Original Name: Rut — “Friendship”

Ruth tells the story of a Moabite woman who accompanies her mother-in-law Naomi back to Bethlehem after family loss. The narrative follows Ruth’s integration into the community through daily labor, her meeting with Boaz, and their marriage, concluding with the restoration of Naomi’s household and the birth of a child.
